



THE READINGS

The Old Testament - Genesis 1:1 -5; 31

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, and the Spirit of God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness, Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day....

God saw everything that God had made, and indeed, it was very good!

The New Testament - from John Chapter 9

As Jesus walked along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him. We must work the works of the One who sent me while it is day; night is coming when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva and spread the mud on the man's eyes, saying to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which means Sent). Then he went and washed and came back able to see.

The neighbors and those who had seen him before as a beggar began to ask, "Is this not the man who used to sit and beg?" Some were saying, "It is he." Others were saying, "No, but it is someone like him." He kept saying, "I am the man." But they kept asking him, "Then how were your eyes opened?" He answered, "The man called Jesus made mud, spread it on my eyes, and said to me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' Then I went and washed and received my sight." They said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I do not know."

They brought the man who had formerly been blind to the Pharisees. Now it was a Sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. The Pharisees also began to ask him how he had received his sight. He said to them, "He put mud on my eyes. Then I washed, and now I see." Some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, for he does not observe the Sabbath." But others said, "How can a man who is a sinner perform such signs?" And they were divided.... A second time they called the man who had been blind, and they said to him, "Give glory to God! We know that this man is a sinner." He answered, "I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know, is that once I was blind, but now I see.... If this man were not from God, he could do nothing." They answered him, "You were born entirely in sin, and are you trying to teach us?" And they drove him out of the synagogue.

When Jesus heard that they had driven him out, he went and found him and said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" He answered, "And who is he, sir? Tell me, so that I may believe in him." Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he." He said, "Lord, I believe." And he worshiped him.

The Continuing Testament - from Sarah Laughed - by Sarah Dylan Breuer [edited]

It's sensible to start with the idea that God is just, compassionate, and in control. But when we look around, we see there's a lot of suffering and heartache in this world. It makes us wonder about why people suffer. There's got to be a reason for all that pain and grief. However, spending too much of our time and energy trying to figure out how God operates in this world, can leave us with little left to actually deal with the reality that's in front of us. I'm as intellectually curious as the next person; but I must avoid the temptation of devoting so much energy *talking* about Jesus compassion, rather than actually *extending* that compassion to others.

In ministering to the man born blind, Jesus answers that very important question of what we should do when we see human suffering. I think Jesus' answer can be summarized as this: "Get back to work!" And maybe the most damning point this raises against Jesus' accusers, is they did not know the blind man who was healed. He sat and begged there

daily, and every day they walked by him, but when the time came, they couldn't be sure of who he was. Or maybe they'd identified him solely by the darkness they thought was inside him - as a social problem indicative of how far society had sunk. For whatever reason, they'd never looked him in the eye or really noticed his face.

As God's people, you and I are called to find some way to look people in the eye before we take their money or as we give ours - to find a face and a name where others see only columns and figures representing social problems or potential profits. Questions about how things got this way and theological reflection have their place, but never at the expense of our call as God's servants and Jesus' followers. We cannot be light to the world until we can see that light in the eyes of beggars in our own town and in our global village - a brother or sister with a face and a name. Jesus shows us the way, and his presence with us gives us courage to live it.
