



Readings

The Old Testament - Exodus 16:2-8; 13-15

The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. The Israelites said to them, "If only we had died by the hand of the Holy One in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger." Then the Holy One said to Moses, "I am going to rain bread from heaven for you, and each day the people shall go out and gather enough for that day. In that way I will test them, whether they will follow my instruction or not. On the sixth day, when they prepare what they bring in, it will be twice as much as they gather on other days."

So Moses and Aaron said to all the Israelites, "In the evening you shall know that it was the Holy One who brought you out of the land of Egypt, and in the morning you shall see the glory of Holy One, against whom you have been complaining, when the Holy One gives you meat to eat in the evening and your fill of bread in the morning."

In the evening quails came up and covered the camp; and in the morning there was a layer of dew around the camp. When the layer of dew lifted, there on the surface of the wilderness was a fine flaky substance, as fine as frost on the ground. When the Israelites saw it, they said to one another, *Man-na?* ["What is it?"] For they did not know what it was. Moses said to them, "This is the bread that the Holy One has given you to eat."

The New Testament - John 6:30-35; 49-55

They said to Jesus, "What sign are you going to give us then, so that we may see it and believe you? What work are you performing? Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat.'" Then Jesus said to them, "Truly, I tell you, it was not Moses who gave you the bread from heaven, but it is my Heavenly Parent who gives you the true bread from heaven. For the Divine Bread is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." They said to him, "Sir, give us this bread always." Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty....

Your ancestors ate manna in the wilderness, and they died. This is the bread that comes down from heaven, so that one may eat of it and not die. I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh." The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" So Jesus said to them, "Truly, I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you. Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life, and I will raise them up on the last day; for my flesh is true food and my blood is true drink."

The Continuing Testament - *Visible Words* - by David Lose [edited]

Do we really comprehend the theological and existential significance of pouring water over a child's head or gathering around the Table of the Lord? And if we don't understand these things, is it really any wonder? I mean, debate about the meaning of the Sacraments rages within the Church, both between different traditions and within them. So the Sacraments hold this unusual place in the Church, in that they are both central to our life of faith and yet also can be very confusing. In an attempt to clarify the connect between the Sacraments and our daily lives, I start with a phrase from St. Augustine: "visible words."

This phrase helps me appreciate Baptism and Communion as the visible, physical counterpoint to the preaching and teaching of the Church. That is, the Sacraments are the embodiment of the proclaimed Gospel in physical form, the Gospel given shape in water, bread, and wine. They serve us as *physical* reminders of what we have heard, because we are physical creatures and remembering can be so hard. And so we have the Gospel *preached* to us so that we may hear it, and we have that same Gospel *given* to us so that we may taste and touch and feel it....

...Of all the truths the Gospel [and the Sacraments] tell us about ourselves, the first is that we are not in control. You don't need to be told this; any illness, or job loss, or tragedy reminds us just how precarious Life is. And yet it is so tempting to believe otherwise, to delude ourselves into believing that we really can be masters of our own destiny....And so what is difficult about Communion and Baptism, in the end, is very simple: we have nothing to do with it, not really. It is God's action of mercy and grace alone; and so we can neither take credit for it nor control it. But this is also what is so crucial about our Sacraments: because they are God's work and not our own, we can trust them! For when all else fails - our relationships, our sources of security, our health, even Life itself - God's promise stands firm. God's word to us in Baptism and Communion remains faithful, calling us back to who we really are in God's eyes: God's washed and fed and beloved children!

United Church of Christ Beliefs and Practices

The United Church of Christ borrows from Scripture and Tradition to express its core beliefs. UCC stresses unity within the church and a unifying spirit to heal divisions. It seeks unity in essentials but allows for diversity in nonessentials, with a charitable attitude toward disagreement. The unity of the church is a gift from God, UCC teaches, yet diversity is to be accepted with love. To permit variety in expressing faith, the United Church of Christ urges testimonies of faith instead of tests of faith.

New light and understanding are constantly being revealed through interpretation of the Bible, says the United Church of Christ. All members of the UCC are equals as the priesthood of believers, and though ordained ministers have special training, they are considered servants. Individuals are free to live and believe based on their interpretation of God's will for their lives, but individuals and churches are called to enter into loving, covenantal relationship with Associations, Conferences, and the General Synod.

The United Church of Christ practices two sacraments: Baptism and Holy Communion. A progressive mix of Christian history and evolving theology, the UCC distinguishes itself from other denominations in its belief that God is "still speaking."

As a result of their acceptance of diversity and evolving theology, the United Church of Christ has become one of the most progressive and controversial faith movements.
