



Readings

The Old Testament - Amos 8:4-12

Hear this, you that trample on the needy, and bring to ruin the poor of the land, saying, "When will the new moon be over so that we may sell grain; and the Sabbath, so that we may offer wheat for sale? We will make the ephah small and the shekel great, and practice deceit with false balances, buying the poor for silver and the needy for a pair of sandals, and selling the sweepings of the wheat." The Holy One has sworn by the pride of Jacob: Surely I will never forget any of their deeds. Shall not the land tremble on this account and everyone mourn who lives in it, and all of it rise like the Nile, and be tossed about and sink again, like the Nile of Egypt? On that day, says the Holy One, I will make the sun go down at noon, and darken the earth in broad daylight. I will turn your feasts into mourning, and all your songs into lamentation; I will bring sackcloth on all loins, and baldness on every head; I will make it like the mourning for an only child, and the end of it like a bitter day.

The time is surely coming, says the Holy One, when I will send a famine on the land; not a famine of bread, or a thirst for water, but of hearing the words of the Holy One. They shall wander from sea to sea, and from north to east; they shall run to and fro, seeking the word of the Holy One, but they shall not find it.

The New Testament James 2:1-7; 14-17

My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favoritism really believe in our glorious Example, Jesus Christ? For if a person with gold rings and fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit at my feet," have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters, has not God chosen the poor of this world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the Realm that has promised to those who love God? But you have dishonored the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you?

....What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

The Continuing Testament *-from Amos: From Personal Piety to Social Justice -* by Daniel Clendenin [edited]

The prophet Amos broadens the concept of sin beyond the single individual to include corporate institutions. He shows that God cares not only about private lives, but also about the moral actions of institutional systems. Personal piety is important to God, but social justice is perhaps even more so. Only large institutions with complex bureaucracies and vast resources - national governments, Wall Street banks, British Petroleum - can slaughter millions, manipulate global markets, and ravage the planet while privatizing profits. Amos wrote 2,800 years ago, but reading him today feels quite contemporary.

The citizens of Amos' day took patriotic pride in their religiosity, their history as God's favored people, their military conquests, and their economic affluence. Like the minority report, Amos spoke to their national delusions. He was the classic outsider who preached from the unpatriotic fringe. He was blue collar rather than blue blooded. The powerful insiders of his day despised Amos as an unwelcome outsider. Amos describes how the rich trampled the poor, how the affluent flaunted their expensive lotions, elaborate music, and vacation homes with beds of inlaid ivory. He decried corrupt judges selling justice to the highest bidder, predatory lenders exploiting vulnerable families - and above all - religious leaders pronouncing God's blessing on it all.

With Israel at the peak of its power, and having good reasons to believe that no disaster could befall it, Amos preached a counter-intuitive message. To the country's disbelief, he said that Israel was no different than the pagan nations with their war crimes. Convinced of the nobility of their own nation and of the inferiority of foreigners, they found it impossible to understand how others saw them. They considered their country superior in every way, and developed an exaggerated sense of exceptionalism which they invoked to exempt themselves from universal standards that applied to others.
