

The Readings

The Old Testament - Jeremiah 29:4-14

Thus says the Holy One, the God of Israel, to all the exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. Seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Holy One on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare. For thus says the Holy One, the God of Israel: Do not let the prophets and the diviners who are among you deceive you, and do not listen to the dreams that they dream, for it is a lie that they are prophesying to you in my name; I did not send them.

For thus says the Holy One: Only when Babylon's seventy years are completed will I visit you, and I will fulfill to you my promise and bring you back to this place.

For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Holy One, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. Then when you call upon me and come and pray to me, I will hear you. When you search for me, you will find me; if you seek me with all your heart, I will let you find me, says the Holy One, and I will restore your fortunes and gather you from all the nations and all the places where I have driven you, and I will bring you back to the place from which I sent you into exile.

The New Testament - Mark 6:31-44

Jesus said to his disciples, "Come away to a deserted place by yourselves and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. As Jesus went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

When it grew late, his disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now very late; send them away so that they may go into the surrounding country and villages and buy something for themselves to eat." But Jesus answered them, "You give them something to eat." They said to him, "Are we to go and buy two hundred denarii worth of bread, and give it to them to eat?" And he said to them, "How many loaves have you? Go and see." When they had found out, they said, "Five, and two fish." Then he ordered them to get all the people to sit down in groups on the grass. So they sat down in groups of hundreds and of fifties.

Taking the five loaves and the two fish, Jesus looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to his disciples to set before the people; and he divided the two fish among them all. All ate and were satisfied; and they took up twelve baskets full of broken pieces and of the fish. Those who had eaten the loaves numbered five thousand.

The Continuing Testament - from *Count on It* - by Alan Brehm [edited]

It may sound harsh to say it, but we cannot count on God to make all our dreams come true, or to live up to all our presumptions about what our Life is supposed to look like. I think one of the lessons that so often eludes Christians in our day and age, is that there is a vast difference between *faith* and *presumption*. Presumption makes our Loving Creator and Redeemer into a "God-in-the-box" who gives us everything we want. Faith entrusts oneself to God's loving care because of a conviction that God is trustworthy.

Even when we find ourselves in a place we didn't want to be, if we can let go our expectations and accept the grace to thrive in surprising places, we may discover that we can count on God to never forsake us, to see us through whatever comes our way, to bring us to the "spacious place" where we can thrive.
