



The Readings

The Old Testament - Genesis 2:15-17; 3:1-7

God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it. And God commanded the man, "You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die."

....Now the serpent was more subtle than any other animal that God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God say, 'You shall not eat from any tree in the garden'?" The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die." But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil!"

So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.

The New Testament - Matthew 4:1-11

Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished. The tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread." But he answered, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God."

Then the devil took him to the holy city and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down; for it is written in Scripture, 'God will command the angels concerning you,' and 'On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone." Jesus said to him, "Again it is written, 'Do not put your God to the test."

Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendor; and said to him, "All these I will give you, if you will fall down and worship me." Jesus said to him, "Away with you, Satan! for it is written, 'Worship the Sovereign One, and serve only God." Then the devil left him, and angels came and ministered to him.

The Continuing Testament - from *Of Stones and Bread* - by Melissa Bane Sevier [edited]

Jesus faces several temptations after his formative time in the wilderness. He's learned so much as he's put himself in touch with his calling, his humanity, his spirit, God's spirit. The first temptation - to turn stones into bread - is about meeting real needs. Why not take a shortcut if you can, and meet those needs faster? Why not, indeed? Because it's the work that goes into the bread that makes it meaningful, and delicious enough to feed both body and soul. Bread takes time. Place seed in the ground. Wait for rain and sun. Weed and harvest. Thresh and grind. Add ingredients. Knead. Bake. Serve. Enjoy.

Shortcutting the process of satisfying human hunger (physical or spiritual) means the outcome can't be as meaningful or as effective. Jesus extends the metaphor by saying that we don't just live from bread, but from every word that comes from God. That Godbread creates community around the table, feeds the hungry body and soul, and requires us to reach out to others.

In such a way, we're to reject taking the easy way out when looking for solutions to real problems. Instead, we search for ways that create community, feed body and soul, reach out to the excluded.

We won't solve any of our current problems with the stone-bread of hatred, but we may do so with the God-bread of reconciliation. We won't create community with the stone-bread of anger, but we may do so with the God-bread of compassion.

We won't bring positive change with the stone-bread of fear, but we may do so with the God-bread of hope. We won't grow as a society with the stone-bread of alienation and separation, but we may do so with the God-bread of welcome and acceptance. So let's chuck the stones. Not at each other, but in favor of the time-consuming, inclusive processes that are nourishing and which create community.
