Pastor's Ponderings

...on How We Got Here...

Most of you reading this are familiar with the form our BUCC Mission Statement that is found on the cover page of each Pillar and Sunday bulletin: *Loving, Serving, and Accepting All People with God's Life-Changing Power!* I thought it might be interesting to remind you [or inform those of you who weren't here] of how this statement came to be. On Sunday afternoon, May 21, 2006, we had a "Mission Statement Workshop" here at BUCC, followed by a pot-luck supper. [We do like our potlucks!] This gathering was well attended by Church Council and Ministry Team members, and many other interested individuals. After a preliminary presentation, we divided into small groups to share what kind of things we as individuals and as a family of faith truly value and desire to advance. We then heard from each group, and blended those results into these six *BUCC Core Values*:

1. Inclusiveness in all things
2. A community of love, acceptance, and forgiveness
3. Unleashing people's gifts of ministry to help them grow through serving others
4. An environment of learning and spiritual growth
5. Creative and dynamic worship
6. Reaching out to, and welcoming the community

From those Core Values, we then came-up with our proposed Mission Statement: *To Love, Serve, and Accept All People with God's Life-Changing Power!* At a Congregational Meeting that Fall - on Rally Day, September 10th - we unanimously affirmed those Core Values, and adopted our Mission Statement. I think it's important to remember that this Mission Statement wasn't developed in a void, or handed-down from on-high. It was crafted through the faithful efforts and prayerful consideration of many of our members, in a methodical and open process. And perhaps, best of all, it is infused with the generous and loving Spirit that has been a hallmark of this faith community throughout the generations.

Now that the congregation is moving into a new phase of pastoral leadership, it might be a good time to take some time to reflect on that Mission Statement and those Core Values. They remind us of the things that truly matter to this community of faith, and that help make BUCC a unique and important presence within our larger community. I would also encourage you to think about what other values, hopes, and dreams you might raise-up for this church; share your ideas with others; and consider new ways in which you can continue to let your light shine throughout this community .

I am so fortunate to serve in a church that, throughout the years, has embraced such noble, compassionate, and Christ-like values as these. And I'm happy for the many new opportunities you will have to carry them forward.

By the time you read this, the hunger meal at Pearl Road on May 19th will have been served. The next hunger meal is scheduled for August 4th at Iglesia Emmanuel. The usual menu will be prepared and served, and the usual sign-up board will appear in the narthex for people to indicate their interest in participating. The first shift will arrive about 2:30 PM to set up and prepare, and the second shift will arrive about 4:00 PM to serve and clean up. About 30 to 40 persons are expected to show up for the meal.

Pulse Night of Remembrance

On June 12, 2016, Omar Mateen, a 29-year-old security guard, killed 49 people and wounded 53 others in a mass shooting inside Pulse, a gay nightclub in Orlando, Florida. He was shot and killed by police officers after a three-hour standoff.

In a 911 call shortly after the shooting began, Mateen swore allegiance to the leader of the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant, and said the U.S. killing of Abu Waheeb in Iraq the previous month "triggered" the shooting. He later told a negotiator he was "out here right now" because of the American-led interventions in Iraq and in Syria and that the negotiator should tell the United States to stop the bombing. The incident was deemed to be a terrorist attack by investigators.

Pulse was hosting a "Latin Night," and most of the victims were Hispanic. It is the deadliest incident of violence against LGBT people in U.S. history and the deadliest terrorist attack in the U.S. since the September 11 attacks in 2001.

The Stonewall Riots Anniversary

The Stonewall riots (also referred to as the Stonewall uprising or the Stonewall rebellion) were a series of spontaneous, violent demonstrations by members of the gay (LGBT) community in protest against a police raid that took place in the early morning hours of June 28, 1969, at the Stonewall Inn in the Greenwich Village neighborhood of New York City. They are widely considered to constitute the most important event leading to the gay liberation movement and the modern fight for LGBT rights in the United States.

Very few establishments welcomed openly gay people in the 1950s and 1960s. Those that did were often bars, although bar owners and managers were rarely gay. At the time, the Stonewall Inn was owned by the Mafia. It catered to an assortment of patrons and was known to be popular among the poorest and most marginalized people in the gay community: drag queens, transgender people, effeminate young men, butch lesbians, male prostitutes, and homeless youth. ►

Police raids on gay bars were routine in the 1960s, but officers quickly lost control of the situation at the Stonewall Inn. Tensions between NYC police and gay residents of Greenwich Village erupted into more protests the next evening, and again several nights later. Within weeks, Village residents quickly organized into activist groups to concentrate efforts on establishing places for gays and lesbians to be open about their sexual orientation without fear of being arrested.

After the Stonewall riots, gays and lesbians in New York City faced gender, race, class, and generational obstacles to becoming a cohesive community. Within six months, two gay activist organizations were formed in New York, concentrating on confrontational tactics, and three newspapers were established to promote rights for gays and lesbians. Within a few years, gay rights organizations were founded across the U.S. and the world. On June 28, 1970, the first gay pride marches took place in New York, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Chicago commemorating the anniversary of the riots. Similar marches were organized in other cities. Today, Gay Pride events are held annually throughout the world toward the end of June to mark the Stonewall riots. The Stonewall National Monument was established at the site in 2016.

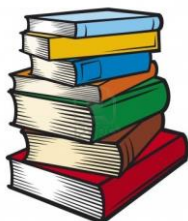
