Pastor's Ponderings.....

One of the tasks of the UCC History and Polity course that I took was to write up a short summary of what we appreciate about the United Church of Christ. I think it's great to learn about who we are, so let me share some highlights with you.

1. An Emphasis on Unity - The United Church of Christ takes Jesus' prayer in John 17 seriously: "that all may be one." This is the only prayer that Jesus made for the church, and we have been woefully bad at fulfilling it. The UCC takes Jesus' prayer and runs with it. The two churches that united to form the UCC in 1957, the Evangelical and Reformed Church, and the Congregational Christian Churches, were themselves the result of two earlier unions, so the UCC talks about the four streams of our tradition, Evangelical, Reformed, Congregational, Christian Churches. I greatly admire the UCC drive to find a way to live together amidst theological and institutional diversity.

2. A Celebration of Diversity - The UCC didn't just find a way to live together in uniting, it found a way to celebrate diversity. Theologically, this works out to an emphasis on each member and each church being able to follow the leading of the Holy Spirit as they hear it. Not only are members expected to give space for others who hear a different voice, but they are encouraged, within the bounds of the broadest Christian tradition, to support others in their alternative path. This is perhaps not surprising since the church has been composed of people of radically different understandings of church: Synods in control for the Evangelical & Reformed stream, and individual congregations making decisions for the Congregational Christian stream. The churches are held together by the idea of covenant, that is, a commitment to one another no matter what.

3. A strong Social Justice Component - The founding UCC churches can trace their social justice roots into the deep past. Congregational churches protested against slavery, and later sent teachers into the Deep South to teach newly freed African Americans, establishing schools and colleges. The UCC has stood out in its commitment to justice for African Americans, for gays and lesbians, and equality for women. ►

The church insists that all people be treated with equal dignity. It's strong commitment to the proposition that Christ is for everyone, and that everyone is welcome in UCC churches has made this church a moral force to be reckoned with. Brecksville UCC shares in this commitment to justice and a warm welcome for all.

Those are just a few of the most outstanding traits of the United Church of Christ. I'm proud of our heritage, and you should be, too!

On Wednesday, October 16th, nine members of your BUCC Council and Pastor Allen met with one of the developers who is interested in making a bid to develop the Central School property next door to the church. One of the plans they are proposing would include the church property as well. This meeting was to share information only. No offers were made to purchase our property, but our property is the only non-city-owned parcel, beyond Central School, being considered for development. A timeline for how these plans might move forward is not available at this time, but it will likely be more than a year into the future. Our moderator, Jim Duffy, will continue to attend all public meetings of the Resident Recommendation Committee. Other members of the congregation are encouraged to attend as well. Any information that is gleaned will be shared with the entire church community. Please remember that any decisions about our property must be made with the consent of the Congregation.

NEWS FROM OCWM

Thank you all for your support of BUCC outreach efforts during this year. It has been amazing.

The mitten tree has sprouted in the narthex again, just waiting to be "decorated" with hats, mittens, scarves, etc. to be delivered



to those who will need them in the cold weather again. They are delivered to hunger centers when the donated food items are delivered to hunger centers.

The next hunger meal will be served at Iglesia Emmanuel on Sunday, December first. About 30 to 50 meals are anticipated to be prepared and served. The menu will be the usual mostaccioli, salad, and cookies for dessert. Look for the sign-up board in the narthex if you are interested in participating.

The next designated offering will be the Christmas Offering, to be received on Sunday, December 22nd. The collection will be used to provide gifts and pension supplementation for clergy and lay employees at all stages in their lives and ministries. Intersex Day of Remembrance

Intersex Day of Remembrance is observed on November 8th and aims to draw attention to the issues faced by members of the intersex community. Sex characteristics of intersex people do not allow to distinctly identify them as male or female.



International Stand Up to Bullying Day

International STAND UP to Bullying Day is a special semi-annual event in which participants sign and wear a pink “pledge shirt” to take a visible, public stance against bullying. The event takes place in schools, workplaces, and organizations in 25 countries around the globe on the third Friday of November to coincide with Anti-bullying week, and then again on the last Friday of February. International STAND UP to Bullying Day is a special semi-annual event in which participants sign and wear a pink “pledge shirt” to take a visible, public stance against bullying. ►

The first International STAND UP to Bullying Day took place in February 2008. 236 schools, workplaces and organizations representing more than 125,000 students and staff registered to take a STAND against Bullying by signing and wearing a special pink pledge shirt.

Transgender Day of Remembrance

Transgender Day of Remembrance takes place on November 20, 2019. Transgender Day of Remembrance (TDoR) is a day to memorialize those who have been killed as a result of transphobia, or the hatred or fear of transgender and gender non-conforming people, and acts to bring attention to the continued violence endured by the transgender community. The Transgender Day of Remembrance was founded in 1998 by Gwendolyn Ann Smith, a transgender graphic designer, columnist, and activist, to memorialize the murder of Rita Hester in Allston, Massachusetts. Since its inception, TDoR has been held annually on 20 November, and has slowly evolved from the web-based project started by Smith into an international day of action. Typically, a TDoR memorial includes a reading of the names of those who lost their lives during the previous year and may include other actions, such as candlelight vigils, art shows, food drives, film screenings, marches, among others. The Transgender Day of Remembrance is the culmination of Transgender Awareness Week.

PFLAG - Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays. This is a local and national organization that has been in the Cleveland Area for 35 years. One of the services provided is a Monthly Support Group Meeting. The group is led by a licensed Psychologist and Social Workers. The purpose is to provide support and education to family and friends of people coming out Gay, Lesbian, Trans, Bisexual or Questioning. STEWARDSHIP 2019

I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to God except through me. – John 14:6

Our annual **Stewardship 2019** is underway. Stewardship Sunday will be November 17. This year our theme is **I am the way...** and the scripture from John 14:6 is the focus of reflection. Please take a few moments to carefully consider what stewardship means to you and to our broader church family. We are all stewards, which means

that you help manage resources. As stewards of God, we try to manage our resources so that they serve God's purposes to make the church and the world more like the communities God wants them to be.



What is stewardship? We share a particular way of being Christian and being church. We are not alone. The early Christian movement was known internally as well as to its persecutors as the **Way** (Acts 9). The life of faith is a way of being human, a way of interpreting, a way of practicing, and a way of living.

- The *wisdom* tradition of the faith often spoke of the Way. God watches over the way of the righteous (Psalm 1:6)
- The *prophetic* tradition of the faith also refers to faith as a Way. Prepare the way of our God, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. (Isaiah 40).
- Jesus refers to himself and his commitment to a cruciform Way of life as “I am the way..” (John 14:6).
- Paul advising the early church in Corinth being torn asunder with division counsels that in the way of love, he would show them a more excellent way. (I Corinthians 12:31)

You are invited to reflect on this shared way and how we individually and collectively are stewards of this way. Stewarding your faith community by pledging support allows the church to plan the way forward. ►

And this year, be reminded that giving is a way to participate in a church community striving to live in such a way that the reign of God becomes real in each of us and is extended through us.

Note that by the end of October, you should receive a letter from our moderator that includes a pledge card. On Sunday November 17, prior to our annual Thanksgiving dinner, we will collect the pledge cards during the worship service.
