Readings

First Reading

Hosea 1:2-4, 6-10 (The Inclusive Bible)

When YHWH first spoke to Hosea, YHWH said: “Go! Marry a prostitute and beget children of prostitution! For the land is guilty of the most hideous kind of prostitution by forsaking YHWH.”

So Hosea married Gomer who conceived and bore a son. Then God said to Hosea, “Name him ‘Jezreel,’ for soon I will take my revenge on the house of Jeru for the slaughter at Jezreel, and I will destroy the dominion of Israel.”

Then Gomer conceived again and bore a daughter. God said to Hosea, “Name her Lo-ruhamah - ‘No Compassion’ - for I will no longer hold dear the house of Israel. But I will hold dear the house of Judah and will rescue them - not by the bow or by the sword or by battle or by horses or riders, but by YHWH their God.”

Once Gomer had weaned Lo-ruhamah, she conceived again, and bore another son. God said: “Name him Lo-ammi - ‘Not my People’ - for you are not my people and I will not be your God. Yet the people of Israel will be as numerous as the sands of the seashore that can neither be measured nor counted. And one day, instead of it being said of them ‘You are not my people,’ it will be said, ‘You are the children of the living God.’ ”

Gospel Reading

Luke 11:1-13 (NRSV)

One day Jesus was praying, and when he had finished, one of the disciples asked, “Rabbi, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples.”

Jesus said to them, “When you pray, say, ‘Abba God, hallowed be your Name! May your reign come. Give us today tomorrow’s bread. Forgive us our sins, for we too forgive everyone who sins against us; and don’t let us be subjected to the test.’ ”

Jesus said to them, “Suppose one of you has a friend, a neighbor, and you go to your neighbor at midnight and say, ‘Lend me three loaves of bread, because friends of mine on a journey have come to me, and I have nothing to set before them.’ Then your neighbor says, ‘Leave me alone. The door is already locked, and the children and I are in bed. I can’t get up to look after your needs.’ I tell you, though your neighbor will not get up to give you the bread out of friendship, your persistence will make your neighbor get up and give you as much as you need.”

Gospel Reading (continued)

“That’s why I tell you, keep asking and you’ll receive; keep looking and you’ll find; keep knocking and the door will be opened to you. For whoever asks, receives; whoever seeks, finds; whoever knocks, is admitted. What parents among you will give a snake to their child when the child asks for a fish, or a scorpion when the child asks for an egg? If you, with all your sins, know how to give your children good things, how much more will our heavenly Abba give the Holy Spirit to those who ask?”

Continuing Testament - Excerpts from “The Earth Awakens: Reading Hosea in the age of climate change”*

The poetic imagery of Hosea presents God as an offended husband and Israel as an offending wife. Such imagery is deeply problematic for us in our own gender-aware context. It is, nevertheless, the text we are given in Hosea. It is part of our interpretive responsibility and freedom to see how such ancient imagery might play in our own imagination when we move the poem from that ancient context to our own.

That divine command that Hosea obeyed caused him to experience, exhibit, and give voice to the pathos (suffering love) in his own life. He came to understand by his humiliating social experience that life consists not in stern rule-keeping but in the exercise of mercy and compassion that moves well beyond rules.

In Hosea, the judgement that follows the word “therefore” is astonishing. The earth shrivels and dries up and can no longer sustain life. Who would have known that violation of the Ten Commandments would lead to the failure of creation? Well, Hosea would know that! The human choices, so Hosea attests, have not been good; for that reason the future of creation cannot be good either. It is as though the poet traces inescapable outcomes and consequences of such violations.

We now hear Hosea’s poetic utterance at a great chronological, cultural distance. We read it in a public context that evokes a dispute about “protecting the environment” and “maintaining a growth economy.” We read it in the context of a supposed scientific dispute about global warming, though the scientific evidence for global warming is not much disputed any more.

We may now ponder the poetic “therefore.” We may do so with a grain of salt about “supernatural” agency. We do not believe that God would swoop in and punish. Nor did Hosea! But Hosea did believe that there is a mysterious presence of holiness that sets limits on human choices that violate God’s purposes only at great cost.
