Pastor's Ponderings.....

"Blessed is the one who grabs your little children and smashes them against a rock." Psalm 137:9

Yes, it's in the Bible. And it is wrong, very wrong no matter how you try to spin it. So usually, we preachers will quietly omit that verse.

But don't turn away. Read it. I hope we can all agree, atheists and devout believers, smashing babies is always a bad idea. No matter which child, no matter which rock.

CNN warned me before showing a graphic image of a dead Jewish baby killed by Hamas militants. The number of children reported killed in Gaza during Israel's military response has reportedly surpassed 3,000. But killing children – must I really write this in 2023? – killing children is never a blessing. Psalm 137:9 is wrong on that point.

Psalm 137 is a poignant song of longing for a homeland during exile.

By the rivers of Babylon, we sat down and cried...

They said, "Sing a song from Zion for us!"

How could we sing the LORD's song in a foreign land?

Our hearts break for the exiles longing for home. With God, we stand with the oppressed. Israel, Palestine, I hear you. I stand with you. Except for that whole part about smashing babies. I cannot accompany you all the way to verse nine.

After wandering in the desert, the Israelites, freed from slavery in Egypt, look across the Jordan. Deuteronomy 34 sets the borders of the land of Israel. Joshua led the Israelites to wipe out the Canaanite inhabitants and seize their land. Through the centuries, that land was seized by the Babylonians, the Persians, the Greeks, the Romans, the Muslims, the Christians, the Ottoman empire, and the British empire.

This geopolitical morass began as a religious problem. Christians, Jews, and Muslims have been squabbling over this real estate. We each look to our sacred texts and seek justification for our premise that it's "mine." After all, God gave it to "my people," not "you people." Religious leaders started this problem; we must be part of fixing it. Perhaps that day will come when the world's religious fervor is about sharing Earth's resources with grace, instead of dominating them with violence.

Religion started this problem. So, it feels disingenuous for faith leaders to tell governments to fix what is really just our own bad theology. Let's start by fixing the problem with our religion.

Bad faith leaders sow tribalism and fear. Good faith leaders reconcile and heal. Religion started this problem. Bad theology gets people killed. Good spirituality seeks peace and coexistence.

Spiritual growth means finding the humility to recognize when we've gotten carried away with ourselves. And until we pastors, rabbis and imams, and all people of faith, get it together and fix that bad theology, then we are merely shifting the blame. We are telling our politicians to find the remedy to the intractable argument that we began with our extremist theology.

Bad theologians can't just point to politicians and escape culpability. We need to reorient our spirituality. Remember these core principles: Love one another. Treat others the way you want to be treated. Share your bread with the hungry. Welcome the stranger and the exile. Forgive. Heal.

Our sacred texts challenge us clearly to seek ways of peace, to work for justice, to live with compassion, to welcome the stranger. Surely the scriptures find substantial grounds for peace and reconciliation; at least as substantial as whatever flimsy scriptural arguments could justify what is happening now.

Perhaps when we religious folk prioritize the shared teachings of compassion, justice and respect for human dignity, values shared by all three Abrahamic religions, we can participate in solving the problem we began. Our faiths teach us to promote peace and reconciliation. There will always be grudges to hold and innocent lives to avenge. Until we seek a higher path.

Love is the path. Peace is the destination.
