Readings

First Reading Eph 2:11–22 (The Message)

The Messiah has made things up between us so that we're now together on this, both non-Jewish outsiders and Jewish insiders. He tore down the wall we used to keep each other at a distance. He repealed the law code that had become so clogged with fine print and footnotes that it hindered more than it helped. Then he started over. Instead of continuing with two groups of people separated by centuries of animosity and suspicion, he created a new kind of human being, a fresh start for everybody.

Christ brought us together through his death on the cross. The Cross got us to embrace, and that was the end of the hostility. Christ came and preached peace to you outsiders and peace to us insiders. He treated us as equals, and so made us equals. Through him we both share the same Spirit and have equal access to God.

That's plain enough, isn't it? You're no longer wandering exiles. This kingdom of faith is now your home country. You're no longer strangers or outsiders. You belong here, with as much right to the name Christian as anyone. God is building a home. God's using us all—irrespective of how we got here—in what God is building. God used the apostles and prophets for the foundation. Now God's using you, fitting you in brick by brick, stone by stone, with Christ Jesus as the cornerstone that holds all the parts together. We see it taking shape day after day—a holy temple built by God, all of us built into it, a temple in which God is quite at home.

Gospel Reading John 8:3-11 NRSV

The scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery; and making her stand before all of them, they said to him, "Teacher, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery. Now in the law Moses commanded us to stone such women. Now what do you say?" They said this to test him, so that they might have some charge to bring against him.

Jesus bent down and wrote with his finger on the ground. When they kept on questioning him, he straightened up and said to them, "Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." And once again he bent down and wrote on the ground.

When they heard it, they went away, one by one, beginning with the elders; and Jesus was left alone with the woman standing before him. Jesus straightened up and said to her, "Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?"

She said, "No one, sir."

And Jesus said, "Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again."

"Mending Wall"

Something there is that doesn't love a wall, That sends the frozen-ground-swell under it, And spills the upper boulders in the sun; And makes gaps even two can pass abreast. The work of hunters is another thing: I have come after them and made repair Where they have left not one stone on a stone, But they would have the rabbit out of hiding, To please the velping dogs. The gaps I mean, No one has seen them made or heard them made. But at spring mending-time we find them there. I let my neighbor know beyond the hill; And on a day we meet to walk the line And set the wall between us once again. We keep the wall between us as we go. To each the boulders that have fallen to each.

And some are loaves and some so nearly balls We have to use a spell to make them balance: 'Stay where you are until our backs are turned!' We wear our fingers rough with handling them. Oh, just another kind of out-door game, One on a side. It comes to little more: There where it is we do not need the wall: He is all pine and I am apple orchard. My apple trees will never get across And eat the cones under his pines, I tell him. He only says, 'Good fences make good neighbors.' Spring is the mischief in me, and I wonder If I could put a notion in his head: 'Why do they make good neighbors? Isn't it Where there are cows? But here there are no cows. Before I built a wall I'd ask to know What I was walling in or walling out, And to whom I was like to give offense. Something there is that doesn't love a wall, That wants it down.' I could say 'Elves' to him, But it's not elves exactly, and I'd rather He said it for himself. I see him there Bringing a stone grasped firmly by the top In each hand, like an old-stone savage armed. He moves in darkness as it seems to me. Not of woods only and the shade of trees. He will not go behind his father's saying, And he likes having thought of it so well He says again, 'Good fences make good neighbors.'

HOLY WEEK - Just as spring cannot be fully appreciated without winter, the joy and victory of Easter cannot be fully experienced without the liberating message of Maundy Thursday and the devastated disciples on Good Friday. The story of our salvation is told in all these events.

So, I encourage you to participate fully and invite your family to share in <u>all</u> of the events of Holy Week. This encourages us to experience the profound significance of Christ's life, death and resurrection in powerful, life-changing ways.

<u>Palm Sunday – Next Sunday, March 24</u> - Please bring the kids to participate in a joyful celebration with palms and fun percussion instruments. Then the liturgy transitions to the heartbreaking events of Jesus passion and death.

<u>March 28 - Maundy Thursday</u> - The Last Supper recalls the sacrifice of the Passover lamb, which liberated the Hebrews from slavery and death. Jesus introduced another layer of meaning to the Passover, as he broke bread and told us, "Do this in memory of me."

<u>March 29 - Good Friday</u> - Our observance of Tenebrae – gradually extinguishing candles and plunging the church into darkness – powerfully symbolizes the hour when the Light of the World was extinguished as Jesus died on the cross. Using primordial symbols of light and darkness, silence and sound, we remember the power and meaning of the Cross. Every year people are moved to tears by the unique emotional power of this service.

<u>March 31 - Easter Sunday</u> - Of course, Easter Sunday is the main event. The importance and sheer joy of that day in the Christian faith is unparalleled. Make plans now to bring your whole family on Easter morning, Sunday, March 31 at 10:00 a.m.

May participation in all the events of Holy Week be a source of blessing to you and your family. Let's journey together on the path to the empty tomb, which follows the path to the cross.
