### Readings

# First Reading Acts of the Apostles 10:34-43 (The Voice Translation)

Peter stood up and said: "It is clear to me now that God plays no favorites, that God accepts every person whatever their culture or ethnic background, that God welcomes all who are reverent and do right.

You already know that God sent a message to the people of Israel; it was a message of peace, peace through Jesus the Anointed—who is King of all people. You know this message spread through Judea, beginning in Galilee where John called people to be ritually cleansed through baptism. You know God identified Jesus as the uniquely chosen One by pouring out the Holy Spirit on Him, by empowering Him. You know Jesus went through the land doing good for all and healing all who were suffering under the oppression of evil, for God was with Him.

My friends and I stand as witnesses to all Jesus did in *the region of* Judea and *the city of* Jerusalem. The people of our capital city killed Him by hanging Him on a tree, but God raised Him up on the third day and made it possible for us to see Him.

Not everyone was granted this privilege, only those of us whom God chose as witnesses. We actually ate and drank with Him after His resurrection. He told us to spread His message to everyone and to tell them that He is the One whom God has chosen to be Judge, to make a just assessment of all people - both living and dead. All the prophets tell us about Him and assert that every person who believes in Jesus receives forgiveness of sins through His name."

# Gospel Reading Mark 16:1–8 (NRSV translation)

When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?" When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you." So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.

# Readings

#### **Continuing Testament** – By Kate Matthews

In all of our Easter finery, in our celebration and our Alleluias, in flowers and white cloths, it jars our sensibilities to be reminded of Good Friday, to think that we worship an "executed God." At the heart of the Gospel of Mark is the way of the cross.

The passage begins with the quiet appearance of women, coming from the sidelines of the story to tend to what needs to be done, caring for Jesus' body even after death. We can only imagine how they planned to accomplish their task, what drew them back to a place of loss and pain in order to perform an act of tender care.

They had just witnessed brutality that was unusual even in a day of great brutality, under the heel of a brutal empire. Their hearts were surely broken, their minds undoubtedly confused, their lives suddenly without the direction they might have sensed while Jesus was with them.

The tomb turns out to be one of those "spaces where so much of life unfolds," Serene Jones writes, "the hard work of loving, of being present, the grit that allows human life to keep going in the very moments that it encounters the reality of violence and relentless march of death." She claims that God is there, even in the places of death where we are "broken by violence and by love and by the sheer exhaustion of the labor it takes to go on."

That stone is worth some of our time in reflection, too. As a metaphor for everything that keeps us from faithfulness, that large stone seems immovable and makes faith (especially as trust) seem impossible. For the women, the other disciples, Mark's community, and for us today, the call is to Galilee and a new beginning, setting out on the way again, following Jesus faithfully, this time with the terrible knowledge of his suffering and death but also with the world-changing awareness of his resurrection.

One scholar says, "The stone is a symbol for everything that blocks the way. It may be different for each, but for everyone it is a very large stone." We may not want to see or face certain things, but all of us need to remember the path that has brought us this far, and the failures we experienced along the way, just like the disciples so long ago.

#### **Continuing Testament** (continued)

No wonder we tell this story, then, that is central to who we are as a community of faith, a band of believers, two thousand years later. We tell the story of life, even in the face of suffering and death. Setting out on the path of discipleship, perhaps a little more conscious of the cost of that discipleship after our Lenten observance, we do not travel alone. We have one another, we have and are the Body of Christ, the church in the world, and we have a call. Things may never be the same, our assumptions may never be safe, but we are not alone. Charles Campbell has said it beautifully: "Jesus is loose in the world. He is not in our present as a lifeless corpse or in our past as a distant memory. Rather, he goes ahead of us into the future to meet us there and claim us, not on our terms, but on his."

  consider migrating to the front pews. When our videos show empty pews,
  the sanctuary looks vacant even when it is full. So, please populate those
  first pews to ensure that our online presence accurately depicts the vibrant
  and growing congregation that we truly are.
