

Readings

First Reading James 3:1-12 (NRSV)

Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers and sisters, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness.

For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is perfect, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle. If we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we guide their whole bodies. Or look at ships: though they are so large that it takes strong winds to drive them, yet they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs.

So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great exploits. How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire! And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our members as a world of iniquity; it stains the whole body, sets on fire the cycle of nature, and is itself set on fire by hell.

For every species of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, but no one can tame the tongue—a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we bless our God and Creator, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this ought not to be so.

Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? Can a fig tree, my brothers and sisters, yield olives, or a grapevine figs? No more can saltwater yield fresh."

Gospel Reading Mark 8:27-36 (NRSV)

Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?"

And they answered him, "John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets."

He asked them, "But who do you say that I am?"

Peter answered him, "You are the Messiah."

Gospel Reading (continued)

And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him. Then he began to teach them that the Son of Humanity must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again.

He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life?"

Continuing Testament - The Gospel of Peace, by John Dear

"You are the Messiah," Peter responds. Every faithful Jew was expecting a messiah, but they were expecting a violent messiah who would overthrow Rome in a revolution and lead the chosen people to rule Jerusalem. Jesus knows that's what Peter and the gang are hoping for. He also knows that he has nothing to do with violence. He is a revolutionary, yes, but a nonviolent revolutionary who will lead a grassroots movement of nonviolent resistance...

He explains the way of nonviolence, and the consequences he will suffer for his nonviolent resistance to the empire. The Son of Humanity, he explains, "must suffer greatly and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and rise after three days."

Jesus knew the stories of the prophets, how Jeremiah, Daniel, Isaiah, and so many others were persecuted, even killed. He knew and loved John the Baptist. He could see that, if the authorities executed John, he didn't stand a chance. He would face the same outcome.

He started to prepare himself for his arrest, torture, and execution. Part of that preparation was to begin preparing his disciples, too, to help them understand the inevitable outcome.

Jesus was not passive. That is something Mark makes blatantly clear. He was a man of action, someone who took risks, someone who stood up publicly, spoke out publicly, and sided publicly with the poor, the marginalized, the excluded, and the enemy. His was a bold, daring, creative nonviolence...

He was not a fortune-teller: this future was clear for anyone with eyes wide open. It was clear to him, as it was to Gandhi, who knew he would be assassinated, just as Dr. King knew his days were numbered, just as Archbishop Romero knew that in a land of death squads he would be killed sooner or later...

Peter will have none of it. He takes Jesus aside and begins to rebuke him. "Are you crazy?" he must have said. "You can't do that! You'll ruin everything. We can't let you get arrested, tortured, and killed! God forbid!" Jesus turns around, and "looking at his disciples," Mark tells us, rebukes Peter, saying, "Get behind me, Satan. You are thinking not as God does but as human beings do." This is one of the most shocking, surprising statements in the Gospels. Jesus calls Peter none other than Satan, the ruler of the world of violence and death. The charge is that Peter is not thinking as God does... In our shock, we need to ask, how do we think as God thinks? To think as God thinks means to think with a mind of proactive love and compassion, active nonviolence, solidarity with the oppressed, yet in an attitude of faith and infinite peace. Learning this mindset and heart-set, we become more empowered to act as Jesus acts.

Announcements:

LONGTIME MEMBER of BUCC, Dassie Matsuoka, passed away peacefully a few weeks ago – she sang soprano in our choir for many years, and was loved by all who had the privilege to know her. She will be forever remembered as a very humble, gentle and compassionate person. At the age of 19, Dassie and her family were placed in an internment camp for Japanese American citizens during WWII. Dassie wrote a booklet about her experiences, which is available in the church office.
