Readings

First Reading 1 Corinthians 12: 4-13 NRSVUE

Now there are varieties of gifts but the same Spirit, and there are varieties of services but the same Lord, and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of powerful deeds, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

Gospel Reading Matthew 18:1–20. (NRSVUE)

The disciples came to Jesus and asked, "Who is the greatest in the reign of heaven?" Jesus called a child, whom he put among them, and said, "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me.

"If any of you cause one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for you if a great millstone were fastened around your neck and you were drowned in the depth of the sea. Woe to the world because of things that cause sin! Such things are bound to come, but woe to the one through whom they come!

"If your hand or your foot causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better for you to enter life maimed or lame than to have two hands or two feet and to be thrown into Gehenna. And if your eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away; it is better for you to enter life with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into Gehenna.

Readings

Gospel Reading (continued)

"Take care that you do not despise one of these little ones, for I tell you, in heaven their angels continually see the face of my Abba in heaven. What do you think? If a shepherd has a hundred sheep and one of them has gone astray, do they not leave the ninety-nine on the mountains and go in search of the one that went astray? And if they find it, truly I tell you, they rejoice over it more than over the ninety-nine that never went astray. So it is not the will of your Abba in heaven that one of these little ones should be lost.

"If your brother or sister sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If you are listened to, you have regained that one. But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If that person refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church, and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a gentile and a tax collector. Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Abba in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them."

Continuing Testament – Excerpts from <u>Knowing in Community</u> by Rev. Michael Howard, Minister of Faith in Action for the Living Water Association

In today's world, we face a dual challenge as congregations: internally, we struggle with disconnection—from each other, from our mission, and often from our understanding of how faith is lived out in daily life. Externally, the larger community around us is equally fragmented, disconnected from institutions, from place, and from a shared sense of what is true and just.

At our best, our churches have historically been spaces where people come together not just to worship but to form relationships, cultivate values, and discover how to live faithfully in the world. Yet, many of us find ourselves today unsure of how to reconnect with our communities or how to build relationships across the many divides—social, economic, political—that fragment us.

Continuing Testament (continued)

How do we move beyond merely serving our congregants or our communities to becoming spaces where truth, justice, and wholeness are realized in relationship—with each other and with our neighbors?

For our congregations, this means that truth is not dictated from the pulpit alone but is cultivated as we engage with the world around us—through service, dialogue with neighbors, and reflection on shared experiences. This idea should resonate deeply with those of us in the Congregationalist tradition. Our polity- rooted in the autonomy of each local congregation, yet committed to a broader covenantal relationship with other churches—mirrors this vision of communal truth. Congregationalist polity is a lived expression of how we believe truth emerges, not imposed from above but discerned together in community. The way we organize ourselves as churches reflects our belief that God is discovered in the shared discernment and the wisdom of the gathered community.

With these Congregationalists influences, we are well-positioned to speak into the public square about this understanding of truth. Our structure and our theology equip us to embody a vision of communal truth in a world increasingly fractured by misinformation and individualism. We can offer the world an alternative - a way of knowing and discovering truth that is rooted in relationships, shared inquiry, and mutual trust.

If we are to be churches where the gospel is understood as a call to justice and well-being for all, then we must embody this communal process of truth in everything we do.

If the church is to carry us into the next phase of humanity and be part of whatever we become, then it will come from those who have recognized this shifting in our understanding of truth. We are poised to offer an experience of truth that the world is hungry for: truth as something that is lived, discovered, and shared together. We can create spaces where the fullness of the gospel-truth, justice, and well-being—is not just a message but a lived reality.
