signaled once again the beginning of a new season of life.



Readings

First Reading Isaiah 55: 1-3, 5d-12 (The Voice translation)

If you are thirsty, come here;

come, there's water for all.

Whoever is poor and penniless can still

come and buy the food I sell.

There's no cost—here, have some food, hearty and delicious,

and beverages, pure and good.

I don't understand why you spend your money for things that don't nourish or work so hard for what leaves you empty.

Attend to Me and eat what is good;

enjoy the richest, most delectable of things.

Listen closely, and come even closer. My words will give life,

for I will make a covenant with you that cannot be broken.

The Eternal, the Holy One of Israel, has made you beautiful.

So turn your attention and seek the Eternal One while it is still possible;

Let those who are busy plotting violence and doing wrong stop right now, turn, and do right.

Let them turn back to the Eternal so they can experience compassion.

God will excuse our past wrongs. Our God's forgiveness is inexhaustible.

Gospel Reading Luke 13:1-9 (New International Version)

Now there were some present at that time who told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mixed with their sacrifices. Jesus answered, "Do you think that these Galileans were worse sinners than all the other Galileans because they suffered this way? I tell you, no! But unless you repent, you too will perish. Or those eighteen who died when the tower in Siloam fell on them — do you think they were more guilty than all the others living in Jerusalem? I tell you, no! But unless you repent, you too will perish."

Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree growing in his vineyard, and he went to look for fruit on it but did not find any. So he said to the man who took care of the vineyard, 'For three years now I've been coming to look for fruit on this fig tree and haven't found any. Cut it down! Why should it use up the soil?'

- "'Sir', the man replied, 'leave it alone for one more year, and I'll dig around it and fertilize it. If it bears fruit next year, fine! If not, then cut it down!"
- Continuing Testament Excerpts from the last sermon preached by St. Oscar Romero in the Cathedral of San Salvador, El Salvador on March 23, 1980. The following day, Romero was assassinated at the altar.
- The great task of Christians is to become absorbed in God's kingdom and, with our spirits so absorbed, to work also on history-making projects. It is a good thing to unite in the people's organizations; it is a good thing to create political parties; it is a good thing to take part in government. All that is good, as long as you embody the kingdom of God and try to implant it wherever you're working— as long as you're not a plaything of earthly ambitions...
- (At this point in his preaching, Romero announces, at length, the many Salvadorans who were tortured, raped, killed and mutilated in the week before. These sermons were broadcast live via radio, providing the only news of those events. Then, he concluded his sermon as follows)[1]
- I would like to make an appeal especially to the men of the army, and concretely to the National Guard, the police, and the troops. Brothers, you are of part of our own people. You are killing your own brother and sister campesinos, and against any order a man may give to kill, God's law must prevail: "You shall not kill!" (Ex 20:13).
- No soldier is obliged to obey an order against the law of God. (Applause) No one has to observe an immoral law. It is time now for you to reclaim your conscience and to obey your conscience rather than the command to sin. The church defends the rights of God, the law of God, and the dignity of the human person and therefore cannot remain silent before such great abominations. We want the government to understand well that the reforms are worth nothing if they are stained with so much blood.
- In the name of God, then, and in the name of this suffering people, whose laments rise up each day more tumultuously toward heaven, I beg you, I beseech you, I order you in the name of God: stop the repression! The liberation the church preaches is just as we have studied it today in the holy Bible. It is a liberation that respects above all the dignity of the

person, the saving power of the common good of the people, and the transcendent vision that looks first of all toward God and derives its hope and its strength from God alone. You can read this and all of Romero's sermons at www.romerotrust.org.uk

PRM- Do you have a concern about the church, the Pastor, something else? We have just the place for you to go to have your concerns addressed. It's called the Pastoral Relations Ministry or PRM (formerly the Pastoral Relations Committee, PRC).

What is the PRM? It is a standing committee of BUCC devoted to promoting strong relations between the congregation and our Pastor, John King. It is not unique to us but is a recommended ministry in all UCC churches. What does this mean to you? It means that if you have a concern or issue with either the church or Pastor John you can come to anyone on the PRM, tell them your issue, and it will be brought to the

attention of our Pastor. I can promise you that all concerns will be taken seriously and will be addressed in a timely manner. Of course, you are also free to bring your concern directly to Pastor John's attention. This would, of course, be a great first option. If, however, you are not comfortable doing that then bring your concerns to one of the Ministry members and we will bring it to him directly. The members of this Ministry are Bob Chandler, Jill Zedan, Mark Lehman, Melanie Kay Falls, Chairperson. We are eager to help you in any way we can.
